Portable Software ...

It is software you can carry with you on a tiny USB drive, or in my case, my little Creative Labs Zen Nano Plus Mp3 player can now do double duty. Since I carry one of my Mp3 players with me all the time to listen to books (http://audible.com), it is really neat to be able to have essential software that can run right on my player, plugged into the USB port of any computer. At that point, my nifty little player ceases to be an Mp3 player and becomes a USB portable drive... able to leap strange computers in a single bound! Sorry about that. I just couldn't resist.

The Machine ... Mp3 players/USB drives are getting cheaper every

day. You can get one just like mine at Amazon for less than half of what I paid for it around 6 months ago. I have a pink one and a black one (hubby won't borrow a pink player) and fully intend to wear them out. It is amazing how something no bigger than a cigarette lighter can be so fun and useful. The little Zen Nano Plus will hold 1 Gig

of data, Mp3 music files or Mp3 book files. It is also compatible with the special file format Audible.com uses. I almost hesitate to add it also has a built in recorder (very tiny but effective built in microphone) and the capability of hooking a special little (very little) cable to a headphone jack on anything and it will record for you. All this on one little AAA battery, good for up to 18 hours at a whack. I've gone through guite a few Mp3

players over the last few years and have to admit, this little goodie is my favorite by far!

Before discovering the teenie players, I was (and still am) very happy with my "big" 60 Gig capacity player, made by Creative Labs. It's about the size of a small radio, but not uncomfortable carrying around. It's held up great the last two years and it can be used as a portable drive too.

I've been walking about three miles a day for the last several years. Being able to listen to great books has made all the difference in the world to this "can't do just one thing - gotta multi task" geekette. My little Mp3 players, great books and three miles a day have kept my fanny from naturally spreading to fit my computer chair. A really good book is sometimes the only thing that can pull me away from the computer.

When you connect an Mp3 player to your computer with a USB cable, it acts like a portable hard drive. Many players come with special software that helps you manage your music or other audio (mp3) files. It is usually as easy as dragging and dropping from a folder on your computer to a folder on your player. If you can see your player as an extra drive in your My Computer area, you may have one that will double as a USB drive. You certainly want to check the documentation to make sure. If you don't already have an Mp3 player, you shouldn't have any trouble finding one that can do double duty as a USB drive.

The Software ... Portable Software is software that has been specially formulated to work on a USB drive. It doesn't require installing a thing on the host computer. Just plug in your drive and go for it! It really is that

simple.

You won't believe how many high quality (FREE) portable programs there are available in cyberspace. The best place to begin your quest for portable goodies is http://portableapps.com. This is a relatively new site, and so far, the most comprehensive and informative site related to portable applications I have found. Plan to spend a lot of time in the forums and educate yourself on not only portable software, but Open Source freeware in general. The software available at portableapps. com right now is just the beginning. There is a very robust community of programmers and users who know what they like and don't mind sharing with the rest of us. Once you get over the initial shock of finding all this FREE software, you can settle down and begin choosing the portable tools you want to download and use. All the basics are there, with more to come.

You will find everything from my favorite browser, Firefox to a completely portable version of OpenOffice.org. You will also find a nice little antivirus package, complete email program, instant message



program, and even a perfectly portable media player. These folks thought of everything, including a neat little web page editor and an ftp program to send your files up with, all for FREE.

Installing ... Installing a portable application is generally no more than unzipping the compressed downloaded folder to reveal the actual software folder. This decompressed

folder will contain all your program needs to run from your USB drive. The file you download may be a .zip file or a .exe file. If it is an .exe file, it is probably a self extracting executable. This means when you click it, the main folder will be extracted. The sizes of the download

files will vary depending on the portable software application. Some are bigger than others, but certainly worth the extra time.

The final extracted folder is the only thing you need to copy to your USB drive. To run your software from your USB drive, just open the folder from your drive using Explorer and click the program icon. That will actually be an executable file that will launch the program for you.

Carry Firefox (4.8 Mb download) with you, wherever you go. Show people you visit how it looks and compares to Internet

Explorer, without ever having to install it on their computer. Just plug your USB drive into your friend's computer and if they are connected to the Internet and you have Portable Firefox on your little USB drive, you can surf in comfort, with all your bookmarks, extensions and any other preferences you have set. Nothing is left on the host computer, and any new bookmarks will go when you go, right on your little USB drive.


There is plenty of information for each program regarding installation instructions and any issues that have been discovered. Not everything works perfectly the first time. I had a little difficulty with GIMP (an image editing program very similar to Photoshop), but after digging through the forum a bit realized I wasn't the only one. I was able to get it to work properly eventually, but think I will let that one evolve a bit more before I play with it seriously.

Portable OpenOffice.org (88 Mb download) (Did I mention it is FREE?) worked great the first time I tried it on my USB drive. The word processor (Write) is smart enough to open the latest versions of MSWord documents, as well as create documents in Word format. The spreadsheet program (Calc) does the same thing with Excel spreadsheets, create your own or open

someone else's. And if you receive *PowerPoint* presentations and want to open them or create your own (and don't have *PowerPoint* installed on your computer), the presentation part of OpenOffice.org (Impress) is just what you need. Heck! The next trip we take may be much lighter. I'll be able to carry my little Mp3/USB drives with me instead of the laptop. Don't let little Trixie (the laptop) know though. She won't like being left at home!

Spend some quality time at http://portableapps.com. Download your favorites and give them a whirl. Even if you don't have a USB drive, you can still use these fully functional applications on your computer. Just put the decompressed folder wherever you want, open it and click away! It is a great way to experiment with software without actually installing it. Use the portable version without adding any actual installation, registry or other system files to your computer and if you really like it, you can always download and install the "non portable" version for permanent use.

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Shopping & the Internet ...



OK... I'll admit it. Amazon.com and I have a *very* personal relationshop. Think about it. Why would anyone want to get dressed for public, fight traffic, crowds and deal with rude sales clerks, only to discover what you really want isn't in stock. They may have it next week, but that isn't going to do you any good. And don't even get me started on the joys of paying sales tax!

I can go to http://amazon.com, find exactly what I want and (if the order is over \$25) they will ship it for FREE. Within a few days, many times a lot sooner than I expected, my goodies arrive at my front door and I'm good to go. About the only thing I have to contend with are my little hounds, who think their mission in life is to get a really good piece of the UPS guy.

I've ordered everything from Greenies for my little hounds at http://dog.com to what has become my favorite footwear at http://crocs.com.

Internet shopping can be a great experience. I don't understand why everyone doesn't shop in their underwear!

In any gathering, you can hear various attitudes and opinions regarding Internet shopping. Some actually believe an anonymous computer is going to steal their identity and they will go to hell in a hand basket shortly thereafter. Here are a few positive points to consider that may help.

Security ... When you use your credit card at a reputable online store, NO human ever sees your personal information. It is encrypted and processed over the Internet by a *computer* which is not interested in gleaning your personal information for future purchases. When you hand over your credit card to a sales clerk, you are much more vulnerable. The key word here is *REPUTABLE*. There are many websites that have become household names and you can feel very comfortable shopping with them.

You wouldn't hand your credit card to a stranger on the street. Don't do it on the Internet. Spend lots of time on the website you are considering using. Browse around. See how easy it is to find what you want. If you have to waste any brain cells, go somewhere else. See if there is a phone number. Use it to talk to a human and ask any questions you want. It is up to *them* to help *you* feel comfortable with their company.

Ask your friends. The best advertisement is word of mouth. See if any of your friends have had good (or bad) experiences with a website you are considering. You will be surprised at how many people you know who have been shopping on the Internet.

Confidence ... Many software companies offer their wares online too. You can download trial versions and pay for it via the Internet when you are satisfied and want to purchase it. By the time you have used the software long enough to decide you want to keep it, you have probably had a little experience with their tech support and know enough about the company to know if you are comfortable giving them your payment information. You have developed a personal relationship with these folks. That doesn't happen in a store, looking at a box.

Convenience ... What can I say? There is a certain satisfaction to be had when purchasing something in a nightie with no makeup on, not to mention what you can save on gas. Of course the downside is the temptation to become a hermit. Think of all the *GERMS* you won't be exposed to!

Competition ... There is lots of it on the Internet. Let your mouse do the walking with Froogle (http://froogle.com) to find the absolute best price. There are even personal reviews of shopping experiences, so you can find out really quick if a company is worth purchasing from or not.

Savings ... Some Internet stores don't charge sales tax. I'm not sure what the rule is, but I believe if there is a store in your state (like OfficeMax or Office Depot), they have to charge sales tax on their Internet sales. That's one of the reasons I like Amazon... no sales tax. I haven't seen sales tax on any software I have purchased online either. Enjoy it while you can. I'm sure our illustrious lawmakers are busting their guts trying to figure out a way to dip into our pockets via the Internet, and they will if they can.

Cut & Paste to Organize Files ...

Cut and Paste and Copy and Paste are two entirely different animals. The Cut command can save a lot of time (not to mention clicking) if you are wanting to organize files by moving them from one folder to another.

CTRL+X is the keyboard command to Cut a file. It will put any highlighted file into the clipboard (the memory of your computer). When you click in another folder, press CTRL+V to paste that file and have the original file removed from its former location.

Highlight the file you want to move. Press CTRL+X (while holding down the CTRL key, press


Navigate to the folder you want to move the file to. Click in any white area of the folder so it becomes the focus. Press CTRL+V (while holding down the CTRL key, press the letter V once) to paste the file into its new location.

This works with folders, files, images and text. If you can highlight it and copy it, you can

cut it to remove it from its present location and paste it into a new location.



This FREE suite of applications takes portability to a whole new level. As long as you can get to a computer with an Internet connection, you can get to your documents and the programs you created them with. And with a whole GIG of storage space thrown into the mix, you really have to admit we have a GEM on our hands here. This can come in handy if you need to use a public computer

and you don't have a USB drive with portable applications, or you do have a portable drive, but the computer you want to use won't, for one reason or another, let you use it. The online

The software is run from the thinkfree servers in cyberspace. You will need to download a small plugin for your browser in order to make it all work but once that is done, you will be ready to create and save files, in your gig of storage space on their servers, or download and save your file on your own machine in any of several popular formats.

thinkfree office suite gives you one other option, and a FREE one at that!



Everything happens in your web browser. I have tested it in Internet Explorer as well as Firefox and it works great in both. You do need to be connected to the Internet in order to use the thinkfree office suite because all the software is on the thinkfree server and runs from there. You can certainly save copies of documents you create onto your own hard drive, but if you want to take advantage of being able to access, update and create documents from any computer, you certainly want to make sure a copy stays in your web

You will find a nice word processor, spreadsheet application and presentation program comprise the

thinkfree office suite. All are compatible with and will create files in MS Word, Excel, and PowerPoint format. All are very intuitive and easy to use, with tools and toolbars you should be very comfortable with if you have ever used Word, Excel or PowerPoint. For folks who need to choose between a decent Internet connection and several hundred dollars a year just to keep your Office programs updated, this is a no brainer. Spend your money on your Internet connection.

Save as a PDF file ... This is almost a sin. You can use any of the applications to open your local files and save them as a pdf file. There is no need to have the full version of Acrobat installed on your machine, or dig around for any other

software to convert files to pdf files for you. It just works, seamless and effortless. Just open your file with the thinkfree program of choice, click the word File at the top of the main editing window, then click Save as PDF.

Cost ... It looks as though they will be introducing a Premium subscription service later this year but the Basic Edition will remain free. Right now I think that includes the 1 Gb of storage space and access to all three applications, but as it develops and if anything changes, I will certainly let you know. 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Tiny Treasures ... MozBackup

If you use Firefox seriously, this is a must have utility. MozBackup is a very straightforward FREEWARE backup utility that will back up everything from your bookmarks to all those neat little extensions you can't live without. If you use more than one computer, or are using the portable version of Firefox, this can be a great tool for copying the settings from your main computer and transferring (restoring) to your other computer or portable copy of Firefox.

The installation file is only 710 KB, that's less than 1 Mb folks. It's getting harder and harder to find these tiny

Hard Disk Space: the final frontier!

And now that I'm falling in love with *Portable Firefox*, it will be nice to know all comfort settings and favorite extensions will always be handy, no matter how I get to Firefox.

Your backup will be a single file and could be several Mb in size, depending on how many

bookmarks, extensions and other goodies you have. Being able to transfer Saved Passwords from one computer to another is a great timesaver. It sure beats spending a lot of time "settling in" a browser on another computer.

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Mrs. Wizard's QuickTips ...

Keep your keyboard clean ... Your keyboard can get really nasty after a few years of tender loving pounding. Keep it clean by shaking it down occasionally. When your computer is turned off, disconnect the keyboard, turn it upside down and shake it. You will be surprised at the crud that can come out. A more effective method is to whip out a can of compressed air. Aim the air between the keys and blow away all the dust and icky stuff that has managed to take up residence. You can also use a vacuum cleaner, but make sure the keyboard doesn't have any loose keys that could be sucked up along with the crud.

If you use a public computer, or one that is used by multiple persons, it wouldn't hurt to disinfect it before you use it. Keep a small bottle of disinfecting hand sanitizer (the kind with alcohol in it) and a soft cloth with you. While the computer is turned off, put the disinfecting cleaner on the cloth, then wipe the keyboard with it, being careful not to get

any liquid into the keyboard.

set up on your XP machine, choose Log Off, rather than Switch User to keep your computer as frisky as possible all the time. Switch User is fine to use

if you are working on something and want to keep it open while another user is logged on, but it does cost resources when more than one person is logged on at the same time. All the settings and any open documents are stored in the memory, and that can slow your machine down. If you are not doing anything critical, Log Off to free up resources.

WinKey+E - Open an Explorer window

WinKey+R - Open the Run Dialog

WinKey+Pause - Open the System Properties

WinKey+F - Find: All Files WinKey+CTRL+F - Find: Computer WinKey+M - Minimize all open windows


WinKey+D - Show/Hide Desktop

WinKey+Shift+M - Undo minimize all open windows

Rename a bunch of Files ... When you download photos from your digital camera, they can often end up with some pretty funky names. Rename several files at once with the following procedure. This also works for renaming other types of files, as long as they are the same file type.



1. Open the folder containing the files you want to rename.

2. Select the files you want to rename (highlight them). If the files you want to rename are not next to each other, hold the CTRL key down and select each one until they are all highlighted. Make sure all the files you are changing have the same extension (.jpg or whatever) at the end of the file name.

3. Click the word *File* at the top of the window, then click *Rename*. (Note: you can also right click any of the highlighted files and choose Rename)

4. Type the new name you want to give your files, then press the *Enter* key. You only need to rename the first file... The rest will follow. Be sure to leave the .jpg (or other extension) at the end of the first file name... You don't want to change that.

All the files you have selected will be renamed in sequence using the new name you just typed. For example, if you type photo, the first will be named photo and subsequent files in the series will be named photo (1), photo (2), and so on. To specify a starting number for the series, type the starting number in parentheses after the new file name. The files in the series will be numbered in sequence beginning with the number you type. For example, if you type photo (10), the other files will be named photo (11), photo (12), and so on.

In my next life I'm going to have more memory installed.
